
Stroll Garden and a Tree Climbing Demonstration . Up to 11 ISA CEU's and SAF CFE's are available.

Tree City USA Applications Due



Communities that qualify have met four criteria during the previous year consisting of: having a tree board; a community tree ordinance; a community tree program with a \$2 per capita budget; and held an Arbor TREE CITY USA. Day celebration and a proclamation.


Maintenance Pruning

Winter is a great time to do maintenance pruning. This involves the removal of dead, broken, defective limbs and crown raising. The reason for this being a great time of the year is the pathogens that attack trees are dormant. This allows the fresh wounds to dry out and be less attractive to an attacking pathogen.



Keep in mind a few simple rules: 1) use proper pruning cuts using the three cut method to prevent torn bark; 2) use appropriate safety equipment for your protection; 3) never

remove more than one-quarter of the live crown in one year - doing so may stress the tree by removing too many leaves; 4) try to keep two-thirds of the tree covered with live branches. The more leaves the tree has, the more energy it can convert from the sun to add to its growth and use in defense against pathogens. These simple rules will allow you to prune and not stress the tree beyond what it can take.



bur oak Quercus macrocarpa

Bur oak is a large tree with a mature height of 70 to 80 feet with a spread up to 100 feet. This tree is appropriate for medium to large yards, parks, and street side plantings with large boulevards. The specie does best on deep, rich, moist, well-drained soil but will grow almost anywhere. The huge size of mature trees are awe inspiring, providing a sense of timelessness in their presence. The leaves are variable in their shape depending on placement in the canopy. They can be deeply lobed to nearly no lobes present. The golf ball sized acorns are the only detrimental aspect of this tree.

Book Review

Diseases of Trees and Shrubs, 2nd Edition is an excellent guide to determining many of our tree diseases. It is one of the most complete references of diseases affecting trees and shrubs in the north America. Disorders caused by more than 470 pathogens and 50 chemical, physical, or unknown agents to plants of more than 300 specie are portrayed, and hundreds of other diseases and pathogens related to those shown are noted. This reference does not cover insect and mite pests of woody plants. Organized by type of pathogen, this book provides descriptions of the signs and symptoms of hundreds of diseases. There are 2200 images showing the symptoms of various diseases. The book also comes with an CD-ROM containing the bibliographical references of the authors.

We fear the enemies of a grove of trees That change with each passing day; Bugs, so tiny, come with the breeze, While disease and fire have their say. Perhaps it's that...


The moods of a grove of trees Can be restful, quiet, or calm; The beauty can bring men to their knees, And the mystery can bring sweat to his palm.
